## J. Warren Mitchell, tenor

Hailed by the *Ruppiner Anzeiger* as "The New, Young Pavarotti," American-born tenor J. Warren is an emerging star in the opera world with a distinct full-lyric voice that is known for singing the legato melodies of Verdi and the passionate, yet tender, interpretations of arias from Puccini.

He has captivated audiences in the U.S. with "those juicy tenor sounds and a winning smile..." (*OperaWire.com*) and a voice that "can trumpet notes and make extraordinary throbbing sounds hearkening back to a golden age when gods like (Giuseppe) di Stefano still roamed" (*OperaWire.com*). In Germany, he has ensnared audiences and critics who have described him as possessing an "unbelievable tenor voice full of power and passion..." (*Ruppiner Anzeiger*). German critics have also praised Mitchell's tenor voice as possessing "Glittering high notes with lyrical brilliance, technically perfect, seemingly effortless in the variation of vocal colors" (*Deutschlandfunk*).

The 2020 season will begin with a return, for the third consecutive year, to Berlin as the featured tenor soloist in a New Year's Opera and Operetta Gala with the Deutsches Filmorchester Babelsberg in the Konzerthaus Berlin. The Lied Society in Minneapolis, MN will present Jay as the featured tenor in a Love Songs and Arias Opera Gala and will present him in recital. The season also brings a return to Palm Springs. CA as a featured soloist with the Palm Springs Opera Guild on their highly anticipated "Opera in the Park" concert.

The 2019 season began with a return to the Konzerthaus Berlin as featured tenor soloist with the Madeburgischen Philharmonie, and a role debut singing Rodolfo in Puccini's *La Bohéme* with Heartland Opera Theatre in Joplin, Missouri. Also, from 200 singers nationwide, J. Warren was named a 2019 Grand Finalist in the Loren L. Zachary National Vocal Competition and went on to win the 5<sup>th</sup> place Award. In the summer of 2019, Jay appeared in concert in Berlin, Germany to celebrate the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of German writer, Theodore Fontane, and was featured in concert with the Palm Springs Opera Guild in Palm Springs, CA.

Highlights from the 2018 season include: Appearance in Berlin, Germany as the featured tenor in concert at the Konzerthaus Berlin with the Staatskapelle Halle, debut as the tenor soloist in *Verdi's Requiem* with the Columbus Symphony Orchestra, concert performance with the Bemidji Symphony Orchestra and the Jacksonville Symphony Orchestra, and a role debut singing ll Duca in Verdi's *Rigoletto* with the Painted Sky Opera Company.

Being a former choral conductor and music educator, J. Warren realized a career in opera was possible when he entered to compete in the Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions. In 2011, he won the Trudy Oliphant Sundgren Young Singer Encouragement Award. Returning the following year, he was named a district finalist and a  $2^{\rm nd}$  place Midwest regional winner. This early success gave Jay the encouragement to resign from his conducting position and pursue a career in opera.

Other awards have included being named a recipient of the Agnes Varis Career Encouragement Grant, and a nominee for the Sara Tucker Award through the Richard Tucker Music Foundation in New York City.

Out of 450 singers worldwide, J. Warren is a two-time winner of the Kammeroper Schloss Rheinsberg International Opera Competition in Rheinsberg, Germany.

As a result, he made European debuts as Alfredo in Verdi's *La Traviata* (2015) and Cavaradossi in Puccini's, *Tosca* (2016). Following this success, J. Warren was invited to the Bellevue Palace in Berlin, Germany to give a concert for the President and First Lady of Germany in celebration of the Kammeroper's 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

Additionally, Jay is a 2013 recipient of the Irene Cummings Hostetler and Theodore Hostetler Full Scholarship in Voice and was a 2013 voice fellow at the Music Academy of the West in Santa Barbara, CA where he worked with Legendary mezzo-soprano, Marilyn Horne, and was chosen my Ms. Horne to participate in her weeklong workshop at Carnegie Hall entitled, "The Song Continues," where he was one of four singers, and the only tenor, who performed in a public master class with her.

J. Warren is the youngest of three children and first discovered music at a young age when he learned to play drums. Eventually, he learned to play the piano and began accompanying church choirs. J. Warren currently resides in Oklahoma City where, in his spare time, he enjoys Salsa dancing and helps to teach weekly classes. His heart and passion for choral music have granted him the opportunity to work with choirs all over the US and abroad.

He received the Bachelor of Vocal Music Education degree from Auburn University (Auburn, AL), and the Master of Music degree in Choral Conducting from Oklahoma City University (Oklahoma City, OK).
